STAYING SAFE ON HALLOWEEN

Whether you love Halloween or loathe it, the occasion is growing in popularity. For many, Halloween is a spine-chilling spectacular and night of unlimited sweets. For others it is simply overwhelming and intimidating. Whether you favour the full-on horror-fest or will be locking your front door and switching the lights off, read on to find out how everyone can get the best out of the spookiest night in the calendar.

Most parents' worst worry at <u>Halloween</u> is simply that their child will eat too many sweets. However Halloween can also be a time of burns and falls, and sadly, <u>car accidents</u>. In fact, data from America suggests that you are twice as likely for a car to hit you at Halloween than any other night of the year.

These top tips from **First Aid for Life** will ensure you keep you and your family safe at Halloween and the evening is memorable for all the right reasons.

Pumpkin prep

Encourage your child to design their pumpkin, but let an adult take charge of the carving to avoid accidents and slips with a sharp knife.

Costume Caution

Masks can restrict a child's vision making it difficult for them to see hazards such as other people, obstacles, naked flames, cars and <u>bikes</u>. Try non-toxic face paint instead. Ensure that you remove the facepaint before the child goes to bed.

Ensure costumes fit well and don't pose a trip hazard, such as a long dress. Footwear should be comfortable and secure. Avoid high heels or ill-fitting shoes. Make sure costumes aren't restrictive, but allow your child the full range of motion in case they fall or slip.

Be aware long capes can be stepped on by others and could choke the wearer. They can also dangle into naked flames and pose a major <u>fire</u> risk.

Fancy dress costumes are not subject to the usual flame-resistant regulations and many are extremely flammable. Be extremely careful to avoid naked flames and be aware of any floaty or dangling parts of the costume that could pose an additional fire hazard near lit candles.

If your child is carrying a prop such as a sword or axe, make sure it is rubber or soft plastic so it will bend if the child falls onto it.

Visibility

Take a torch or flashlight. Most phones have a torch function. Ensure everyone's phone has sufficient charge. Opt for light coloured costumes or ones with fluorescent markings so your children (and you) are more visible in the dark.

Add reflective tape to the front and back of dark outfits, so your children can be clearly seen by motorists and cyclists. Or wear glowing wristbands or necklaces. Increase your visibility by putting your sweets in a white plastic bag or white pillowcase.

Sweet safety

Be aware that the sweets may not be the freshest or most hygienic. Discard anything unwrapped or even slightly unwrapped. Do check any sweets or drinks before you let your child consume them. Don't eat anything homemade unless you are confident you know who made it.

If your child has a nut allergy screen all the sweets yourself. You can't guarantee the homeowner will have remembered to do this. If your child has a nut allergy encourage them to speak up about it.

Remember that hard sweets, popcorn, chewing gum can be a choking risk to excited children. Don't let your child run with sweets in their mouths. Lollies have been known to go right through the child's hard palate if they fall on them.

Halloween Don'ts

The paradox of Halloween is that it breaks all the usual parenting guidance and turns 'Stranger Danger' rules on their head. This is the night we encourage children to accept sweets from people they don't know and to open the door to strangers.

Remind children they shouldn't go with anyone they don't know. They shouldn't get into anyone's car they don't know. And they should never enter a strangers house.

For older children going out together

Make sure they stick in a group of at least three. Ensure they have your contact number and each other's contact number so they can call you in an emergency and can regroup if they become separated.

Work out a short and safe route with them. Ask them to stick to it. Agree a designated meet-up or return time. Set the alarm on their phone to remind them or make sure they have a watch.

Remind them about road safety as when they are in an excited group they can often cross roads without concentrating. Inspect their sweets and drinks on their return before they consume anything.

BALANCING SCREEN WITH OTHER ACTIVITES IN THE HOLIDAYS

What did you do during the holidays?

Children are spending more time online learning, socialising, playing games, creating and publishing in ways that we could not possibly have imagined when we were children ourselves.

Impact of the digital world

Much has been written about the impact that the digital world which, broadly speaking, is either quite negative and focuses on the risks children face online or is more positive and focuses on the educational, school related benefits for children online. But when is comes to the holidays parents often feel that they are being a 'bad' parent if they have let their children have too much 'screen time'.

How is too much screen time?

A sensible balance of 'screen time' and other activities is important but this will vary from family to family and from child to child according to their individual needs, interests and family circumstances and whether it is unsupervised time alone or as a shared activity.

Recent <u>research from the LSE</u> has shown that is not about the quantity of 'screen time' that should be concerning parents but the quality of how that time is spent. Just as the school holidays enable families to spend time exploring new places and doing new things together, rather than just imposing a set limit on how long children are online, good parenting is about talking to children, taking an interest in and understanding what they are doing online and sharing some of the online activities with them.

Making screen time count

Rather than being anti-social, lonely and isolating, screens can be social, connecting and creative. Playing games together, looking up new places to visit or finding out 'what's on' in your area are great ways to share screen time in a positive way and making a digital scrapbook of holiday photographs, mementos and links to places visited means your family can also have a lovely record of the holidays to treasure.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

SELF-CARE: SPENDING TIME OUTSIDE If you're anxious or feeling low, it can be really easy to slowly spend more and more time indoors and at home. We've all been there! Some people find the simple act of forcing yourself to get out of the house, whether to a café to people watch or to the park for a walk, can be a good way to change up your mental state by changing the environment you're in.

If this is something you really struggle with and it feels like a big step, why not just try to get to the end of your road or give yourself a set amount of time, such as 5 minutes, to stay outside? It may feel tricky, but you may also find that once you've made that first step of getting out the house, the times goes by without too much effort.

I spend so much time worrying what I'll do when out of the house, what I'll think about and what I'll say if there's someone with me. It can get to the point I have panic attacks and dread it. But usually once I'm actually out those things aren't a problem and it helps me take my mind off of things.

YEAR 13 INTERVIEW CONFIDENCE WORKSHOP - THURSDAY 7TH NOVEMBER

As part of Kendrick School's commitment to delivering high-quality Careers Education Information, Advice and Guidance, we are delivering an 'Interview Confidence Workshop' to all our Year 13s.

Date: Thursday 7th November: Periods 1-3 (morning)

There is no cost to you for this event.

The day has been planned for students to hear from two industry sectors who will provide up to date information on Assessment Centre Interviews and Professional Interview techniques. The third session will be an interactive small-group interview-practice session, supported by around 26 under-graduate, graduate and apprenticeship student-leaders. The student leaders' courses will be closely matched to the aspirations of our current cohort of students.

This event is applicable to all our students, whether they are:

- Applying for a degree course that requires an interview.
- · Applying for an apprenticeship.
- · Applying for a vacation-internship.
- Applying for a competitive work-placement for a university 'Sandwich Course' (Year Out in Industry).
- Paid and/or voluntary work (professional or casual).

This is a compulsory event for all year 13 students.

KENDRICK SIXTH FORM - OPEN EVENT

YEAR 11 PARENTS/CARERS AND STUDENTS

We would like to remind you about some significant events for Year 11. Our annual **Post 16 Conference** will take place on **Tuesday 12**th **November.** This event will take place throughout the day, students will receive information about post-16 choices and expectations of the universities and industry. Students will also hear about the subjects available at Kendrick School and life in Kendrick's Sixth Form.

The **Sixth Form Open Evening** will take place on Thursday 14th November and will allow students and parents a chance to speak with departments about their potential A-level choices. The event will take place between **4pm and 5.30pm** and this session will be for Kendrick students and their parents only. The subject areas will be open between 4pm and 5pm and there will be a talk in the Hall at 5pm from Ms Kattirtzi, Headteacher, Mrs Hearn, Assistant Head and Head of Sixth Form and some current Kendrick Sixth Form students. **Tickets are not needed for this event**. Students should meet with their parents outside of school and re-enter and register for the event via the East Street entrance. The subject areas will close promptly at 5pm in order for the talk to start on time, so please allow plenty of time to visit all the subjects your child is interested in. Each student can have up to two adults with them, however, unless there are exceptional circumstances (for example, a single parent), for health and safety and capacity reasons, we ask that younger siblings do not attend this event.

Y11 Parents' Consultation will be held online on **Thursday 5th December**. The timings of all of these events have been deliberately organised so that we can support both the students and parents/carers in the decisions to be made about options post-16. In **December 2024**, the students will be asked to indicate subject preferences and from these, option lines will be drawn up and presented to the students at the end of **January 2025**. Students will be expected to confirm whether they will stay on at Kendrick to attend the Sixth Form in **March 2025**.
