LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

What a busy week it has been with so much going on at Kendrick and elsewhere in the world. Firstly, in the Sixth Form, it is the time of the year when Year 13 students showcase their work on their Extended Qualification Project (EPQ). At an exhibition and then at a scheduled presentation each student in Year 13 who has embarked on an EPQ has to present their work on a topic of their choice. The topic that a student may wish to study/research may be of anything that interests them, related or not, to their A Levels or future studies. It is a is an opportunity for students to take a topic about which they are curious and research it is using under-graduate style research methods. They then must write a report and present this to their supervisor and fellow students. This year 46 students will have presented their EPQ project to staff and students. For those who do not know, the EPQ is an additional qualification, half an A Level, that complements a 3 or 4 A Level study programme. The topics have ranged in nature from very specific scientific investigations to broader social and political issues, historical and philosophical ideas. Part of the EPQ study requires students to reflect on what they have learnt in the process of their research and presentation and the study techniques and skills they have learnt and practised in the process, including time management, organisation, writing and research. My thanks to Mrs Rock, Mrs Hearn and the team of supervisors who work with the students on this impressive work. For some students this qualification will assist them in their university entrance and may be pivotal in securing their place at university.

Assemblies this week have had a safeguarding theme, and the assembly topic presented to KS3 and KS4 and next week to the 6th Form was on the theme of the <u>Prevent Duty</u>. This is a responsibility that all schools and public institutions have as part of their safeguarding duties. The aim of Prevent is to stop people from becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism. Prevent also extends to supporting the rehabilitation and disengagement of those already involved in terrorism. The information was presented to students using definitions and animated videos to help them understand the concepts of radicalisation and extremism. Further conversations will happen in tutor time about these themes and others in their PSHCE lessons. As with all such topics, students are guided to speak to a trusted adult in school if they have questions or worries.

I have had a few meetings with some sixth form groups this week. Firstly, with the Kendrick Student Leaders who are planning their activities for the remaining weeks of their period in office. The Curriculum and Current Affairs (CCA) Committee plan to put together some videos on revision tips and advice on exam anxiety to support all the students taking public exams this summer. They also intend to continue their CCA Club that discusses current events, as well as plan activities for the upcoming International Women's Day in March. The Community Committee will begin to plan Comic Relief events for March and the Wellbeing Committee will look the upcoming Mental Health Awareness Events, while House Leaders are working on House Drama in two weeks' time on Thursday 13th February. So much going on! Another group of Year 13 students who I have mentioned before when they were in Year 12, have been discussing with me their proposal to hold one final fund raiser focused on what they are calling an *International Humanity Initiative*. They wish to raise money for the world food programme of the United Nations which is working in Syria following the devastating political events at the end of last year.

Finally, I had a delightful meeting with 50 Year 7 parents at the KPS hosted drop-in session on Tuesday evening. Accompanied by Ms Heath, Assistant Pastoral Leader with responsibility for Year 7, we spoke with parents about life in Year 7 and some of the new processes and procedures our Year 7 are encountering and getting used to. As we all know, the transition from primary to secondary school is huge and the organisation and structure of the school day and the children's learning are very different. We are always so impressed by how quickly our Year 7 students adapt to life at Kendrick, however there were a few issues that parents raised that we shall follow up with students and tutors so that all children feel comfortable and know how things work in school. The next drop-in session is with Year 8 and 9 parents in two weeks' time on 6th February at 5.30-6.30pm.

Thinking of some of the global events that have marked this week, in particular, the peace that was finally agreed in the Middle East that has brought relief to people in that region and worldwide, I wish everyone a peaceful weekend.

UNDERSTANDING ONLINE GAMES SOURCE: NSPCC

Online games can be a great way for children and young people to keep busy and stay in touch with friends and family, but it's important that they play safely.

- age ratings of games they play

- · trolling, griefing and scams
- how to report problems

IS SNAPCHAT SAFE FOR MY CHILD? SOURCE NSPCC

What is Snapchat? Snapchat is a popular messaging app that allows you to send images and videos to other users. These are known as 'Snaps'. One of Snapchat's unique selling points is that messages are normally only available for a short period of time and can only be viewed once.



What age-rating is Snapchat? The platform is rated 13+.

How does Snapchat work? The platform mainly operates as a messaging app where users can communicate with each other using videos and images. However, there are also other features available including private chat, games, and voice notes. You can also create short videos that can be posted to a public feed.

Tips to help keep your child safe on Snapchat

- 1. Make sure they sign up with the correct age Set up your child's Snapchat account together to make sure they sign up with correct age. This will automatically enable settings that help to limit unwanted contact from adults and access to certain features.
- **2. Talk to them about how to feel good on social media** Children and young people can face lots of different pressures online. Use Childline's advice about How to feel good on social media to help give them the tools to manage their wellbeing online.
- **3. Set rules around friends** Before your child starts using the app, talk to them about who they can be friends with on the app. Tell them to come to you if they receive a friend request from someone they don't know.
- **4. Know where to report** There is a chance that your child could come across inappropriate or upsetting content on Snapchat. If this happens, you should report it to the platform. To report a Snap or a story, press and hold on it, then select 'Report Snap'.
- **5. Talk about what is ok / not ok to share** Ensure that your child knows what personal and private information is, and what is, and is not, appropriate to share online.
- **6. Explore the safety features** Click <u>here</u> for 10 safety features that are available, like privacy settings and 'Snapchat Family Centre'.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

SELF CARE - PROBLEM SOLVING SOURCE ANNA FREUD

If you're worried about something, sometimes it becomes much less frightening if you can break that thing down into smaller, more manageable pieces. One way to do that is to start by listing all the possible outcomes, even the bad ones. For example, if you're feeling worried because you don't understand a subject or know how to prepare for the exam, you could write down these potential outcomes:

- Don't revise for the exam
- Try to figure out the work alone
- Ask a teacher or friend for help

The second step would be to list the pros and cons of each solution:

Not revising

Pros: no need to do anythingCons: might fail the exam

Figuring it out alone:

Pros: can start right away

• Cons: might be too difficult or make things worse

Ask a teacher or friend for help:

Pros: someone to explain it, so a better chance of passing

• Cons: waiting for when they can help

The third step would be to choose the most practical solution. In this example, it looks like the last option has the best chances of success.

Once you've decided on a solution or a combination of the solutions, the fourth step is making a plan to carry it out – could you text or call your friend now? Could you ask your teacher for help when you next see them at school? Perhaps it would help to write yourself a reminder to do that.

The fifth step would involve recording your progress, reviewing your plans, and feeling good about your efforts. If you've put a plan in place, such as asking a teacher to help you study, it might help you to feel less worried about the exam, because you know that you have will have more support and resources available to you soon. These steps are based around BBC Health's 'structured problem solving' worksheet, which you can use as a template:
